

Council Meeting
October 9, 2012

Minutes of a Council Meeting of the Borough Council held at 7:30 P.M. on Tuesday, September 11, 2012, in the Council Chamber, Hillsdale, New Jersey. The meeting was called to order by Mayor Arnowitz who also led the Salute to the Flag.

ANNOUNCEMENT OF MEETING

Mayor Arnowitz stated, "This is a Meeting of the Hillsdale Borough Council on this 9th day of October 2012. Notice of the time and place of this meeting has been provided to The Ridgewood News, Pascack Press, The Record and Community Life; a copy was posted on the bulletin board outside of this meeting room and provided to any interested parties.

Please notify the Municipal Clerk for any disability requirements necessary for attendance at Mayor and Council meetings. The fire exits are located through the double doors to your left. Please silence all cell phones and pagers.

ROLL CALL:

Municipal Clerk Witkowski called the roll those present being as follows: Councilmembers DeRosa, Frank, Giancarlo, Hanlon, MacEwen and Pizzella. Also in attendance Borough Attorney Paul.

PRESENTATIONS: Clean Up Day 2012, Hillsdale Boy Scouts

Mayor Arnowitz invited Eagle Scout James Costello to come up. He did a project in town which helped a great deal.

James Costello, 21 Wilts Avenue -

A couple of months ago he approached the borough and explained his Eagle Project. It is finished and he has received great reviews. Through donations from the PBA and Hillsdale Baseball he was able to reimburse the town.

Mayor Arnowitz said the Eagle Scout Program has been a great boost to Hillsdale over the years, all the projects that they do and how they help the borough. He is amazed at what a young man or young woman goes through to become an Eagle Scout. When he was employed he sat in a room with executives and he mentioned that he had been to an Eagle Scout Award. People at the table said they were Eagle Scouts also and it was very evident that

they moved up in the organization because of the things they learned in scouting.

Mayor Arnowitz said last year he asked the scouts for assistance in cleaning up and they did. We picked up a lot of trash and cleaned a lot of areas in town. He wanted to recognize the scouts for what they did and thank them for what they accomplished. This is going to be an annual event.

He presented awards to the Boy Scouts.

APPROVAL OF MINUTES:

On motion by Councilmember Hanlon, seconded by Councilmember Giancarlo, and unanimously carried, the Minutes of the Council Meeting of October 2, 2012, and Closed Meeting of October 2, 2012, were approved as presented.

CORRESPONDENCE:

1. LETTER DATED NOVEMBER 1, 2012, FROM VAROUJAN TOURIAN, 61 TRINITY PLACE.

Mayor Arnowitz said the Council received this letter and it will be filed. Our Code Enforcement Officer sent everybody his response to what took place. This was explained to us last week. Mr. Tourian is concerned because it is an area that gets wet and he wanted to make sure nothing was being done improperly. According to the Code Enforcement Officer, everything is being done properly. We will receive and file this letter, this was unanimously carried.

2. ELECTRONIC CORRESPONDENCE DATED SEPTEMBER 29, 2012, FROM TOM MC CAFFERTY, PRESIDENT-BERGEN COUNTY MODEL RAIL ROAD CLUB.

Received and filed on motion by Councilmember Giancarlo. He said we have a model railroad club which uses the second floor of the train station. The train station is an historic building dated from the 1860's and can only be used for certain things. The condition for the use by the railroad club is that it remain open to the public and there was a request that it be opened during the tree lighting in the center of town.

Mayor Arnowitz said they will do the holiday train demonstration.

DISCUSSION:

1) Hours of Lighting at Centennial Field.

Councilmember DeRosa said last week we discussed the 6PM curfew of using lights on Sundays currently at Centennial Field. The Baseball Association would like to extend that to 8PM and get more games in. He and Councilmember MacEwen talked to most of the residents around Centennial and they were all o.k. with extending the time to 8PM. He wanted this codified so that the times are open to everybody including start times for weekdays and weekends and end times. The Recreation Commission is aware of this and has no objection. Time is of the essence because games can be scheduled now for the fall season.

Mayor Arnowitz said we are going to vote tonight to approve Sunday. Something could be made in a resolution form; resolutions can be changed. The problem the associations have is people ask what are the times and there is nothing in writing.

Borough Attorney Paul said that can be done. He suggested be subject to review as well by the Recreation Commission.

Mayor Arnowitz suggested the Council approve playing until 8PM on Sundays at Centennial Field. We can create information and get it to the Recreation Commission for their opinion and hopefully in November, December or January we can vote on that.

Chief Stalter said we have an existing ordinance that limits the opening and closing of all borough parks. He did not know if there is a caveat for organized activities. Half hour after sunset in the winter and someone is there and nothing is going on, that is trespassing. We should look at the existing ordinance we have concerning the opening and closing of our parks and playgrounds. They will look into this.

Mayor Arnowitz said also they should notify the sports associations that the computer room and door locks will have to be changed and we will share the costs.

Motion

Motion to extend Sunday hours at Centennial Field to 8PM was made by Councilmember DeRosa, seconded by Councilmember Hanlon.

Councilmember Hanlon asked if in this resolution not only will we put in that it is on Sunday but could the other hours also be put on this resolution.

Mayor Arnowitz said if possible put the other fields in there.

Borough Attorney Paul said Code Section 220-1 except for duly proclaimed emergencies public parks, playgrounds and open spaces shall be open for use by the general public at all times between dawn and half hour after sunset; organized use with supervision or permission of Recreation Commission of such times and during such hours as the Commission shall prescribe. The implication is that there is more flexibility for supervised, organized recreation activities.

Mayor Arnowitz said we will do the resolution but the Recreation

Commission has to have it on their records.

Attorney Paul said that is Code Section 220-1, Section A, and particularly part two of Section A.

2) Citizens Budget Advisory Committee.

Councilmember Frank said this is a topic that came up and the Mayor asked us to reconvene the Citizens Budget Advisory Committee. He understood this was in the 2004 era and ex-Mayor Murphy headed it. They looked at a number of areas within the town government and made a report with recommendations and actions we should take to control costs and improve practices. The Mayor asked us to reconvene this committee to help us with the budget challenges we face and ex-Mayor Murphy is still the assigned head of the committee and we reformed it. We are now having meetings. We wanted to be sure how this would be structured and what authority it had. We had some discussions and it appears it is an Ad Hoc Committee of the Mayor and doesn't require reauthorization. We want to make sure department heads, Borough Administrator be aware that this committee will be coming looking for information. All information requests will go through the Borough Administrator, nothing will go directly to the department heads. The topics are being explored right now. We have had two initial meeting, we have new members and we started talking about concepts at the last meeting.

We are looking from the Mayor re-verification that you want this committee to look into various areas of the government and everything should go through the Borough Administrator for any requests for information.

Mayor Arnowitz said that was his intention when he asked the committee to re-form. This committee will be in until the Finance Chairman, Councilmember Frank, will deem it not necessary that they advise us every year. He authorizes ex-Mayor Murphy to form this committee again and work in conjunction with the finance committee and then the Council on their suggestions to help keep the budget in a sane area of spending. Many of their ideas in the past were implemented and they are extremely helpful.

Councilmember Frank said at each meeting we determine the next meeting date on the things that have to be done in the interim. The next meeting is scheduled for the 18th of this month.

Mayor Arnowitz said the meetings are set by ex-Mayor Murphy, not by us. He is in constant contact with the Mayor and Councilmember Frank.

Councilmember Giancarlo said they typically meet in the fall. Mayor has asked for volunteers in the past and usually accountants respond, people who own small businesses, those who have experience in municipal government, land use and they make recommendations. They have no power to implement anything but they go to the Finance Committee with suggestions. It is up to the Finance Committee and the Council to make a decision.

Mayor Arnowitz said that is how our Borough Administrator got started in government; he was on the Budget Advisory Committee and was frustrated when the recommendations were not acted upon. When he became Mayor he re-activated it and ex-Mayor and Administrator DeJoseph implemented a lot of the suggestions. He said we implemented parking lot fees, lighting costs, recreation fees; the first report was quite lengthy and a lot has been implemented.

GENERAL PUBLIC HEARING

Mayor Arnowitz invited comment from the public.

Varoujan Tourian, 61 Trinity Place -

When people go to Centennial Field, they play on a team. The umpiring costs should be shared; if we play with another town, they should contribute, not the fixed costs but the operating costs.

Mayor Arnowitz said the fields are almost used by Hillsdale teams and the cost of the electric, which is considerable, is being shared by the sports teams and the town.

Mr. Tourian (Contd).

If other towns play they should pay for the upkeep.

Mayor Arnowitz said other towns don't use our fields.

Mr. Tourian (Contd).

He presumed that his problem has been studied and if the law applies to him, the law applies to everyone, even non-profit organizations.

Mayor Arnowitz said he read Mr. Tourian's letter and he is going to ask the Engineer and Borough Attorney to give an opinion. We will give you the Code Enforcement Officer's reply to this and once we get an opinion, we will get back to you.

Sonya Kinzler, 401 D'Ercole Court, Norwood

She asked if she could get the numbers of the scout troops.

Borough Clerk Witkowski said she will send her the names and all the information by email.

Ms. Kinzler (Contd).

Regarding extending the lighting at Centennial, what was done - a resolution?

Mayor Arnowitz said no, we had a vote to allow them to play two additional hours if they needed it on Sunday. Originally the lights went off at 6PM, now they will go off at 8PM if they are needed. A resolution will be down the road, it is just reconfirming what exists now. That is a permanent decision. Anything that pertains to the fields has to be approved by the Recreation Commission, so before we do a Resolution, we have to send it to the Commission for their opinion.

George Zanleiter, 42 Washington Avenue -

There was a letter to the editor in the Pascack Press which described low morale in town between workers and nobody cares. He referred to the incident when a gentleman cut down his tree and an employee wanted nothing to do with him, gave him the wrong paper work, and all she said it was an oversight. The other employee returned to work and telephoned him and was very nice. The judge didn't know what we were talking about when he

got here; it has been delayed five months for cutting down a tree. There is still a delay in construction of the Chambers and unacceptable. We are down to one day a week garbage; people used to throw garbage in his dumpster at his place of business and he had to pay Franco. This is what is going to happen here. Animals go through the garbage. There is no notification when leaves will be collected. We used to get the letters but we don't get them anymore. Town Day used to be held at Beechwood Park and it was great, you could bring your dogs, etc. Those days are gone, everything is gone. Apparently you are not doing your job. He will bring the name of a woman to the next Council meeting who worked for four hours for \$300; she makes base pay and makes balloons.

Mayor Arnowitz said we had face painting and the kids thoroughly enjoyed Town Day. He is tired of the election rhetoric that goes on in this town at this time of year. We put on with the help of the Recreation Commission, Councilmember Hanlon, and everyone else, a phenomenal Town Day that our children enjoy and it didn't cost the taxpayers anything. It was all done through donations from the residents and businesses in town. Town Day in the past used to cost the town almost \$10,000. It is our opinion that Town Day was a huge success this year. He is tired of hearing his comments about low morale in town because obviously nobody has spoken to the employees of our town; he has spoken to the employees and they are not demoralized. The situation you had in that particular department was handled the next day. Our town is in better shape than any other town. We have the best Police Department with the best police officers, the best DPW. We worked on the DPW contract, they didn't get what they wanted; they are not demoralized, they are doing their job and they do it well. He asked him to talk to the employees before you reinforce a statement or comment on a letter to the editor. It is not the case; the employees are taken care of, they have their benefits, jobs. Hillsdale is a strong, viable, great community that survives.

We have a one day collected for garbage because we have a 2% CAP that we cannot exceed. The governor's office allows us to exceed the CAP in certain areas and we did. We came in a 2.4%. The year before we came in a 1.9%; people in this town can't afford it. We have a problem in this town, county, state and in this country with overspending and we can't just spend. The project in the Chamber was done by a grant with our efforts. We approved 1.5 million dollars in grant applications last week.

As far as the court is concerned, we do not oversee the court. The judge is independent and abides within the law.

Art Lynd, 72 Westdale Avenue -

His neighbor has done some renovations to his home and water used to travel from the west side of the driveway to the other side of house and is now travelling in the other direction. He does not know the details and he filled out an OPRA request today. He wants to address the water problem he has experienced with the resulting of flooding in his basement and his 50 ft. retaining wall in the backyard. They ignored the town engineer's recommendations for installation of 1,000 gallon tank in the back yard. They received a shipment of 40 yards of soil in addition to the 10 yards of soil displaced and the addition

of a second garage. This resulted in the change of topography, which changed the direction of the drainage and rain water from the east side to the west side of the property in the direction of his house. His basement never flooded before the neighbor's construction.

Mayor Arnowitz asked for everything that he has. He will turn it over to the Administrator who will get the engineer out there to look at what is being done.

Mr. Lynd (Contd).

You have to look at a picture of the house before and after construction.

Mayor Arnowitz said we will ask the engineer for a written report as to your concerns. The law says you cannot put water on someone else's property by your actions. We will take your letter of complaint with the addresses you referred to and the town engineer will look at the property. There has to be some sort of plan when they applied for the permit. He will review what is going on and will provide his opinion in a report.

Mr. Lynd (Contd).

The engineer was at his neighbor's house and he said with any project, you are allowed 40 yards of soil.

Councilmember Giancarlo said he hasn't been over to the property. We take drainage very seriously; we have a lot of flooding issues in this town and the engineer will give it a serious look.

Mayor Arnowitz said if you move soil in and around Hillsdale, you need a permit over a certain amount.

Jim Moldow, 21 Overbrook Place -

We have three strong scout troops in Hillsdale and they do a lot of good work in town. With regard to lights at Centennial Field, you need to look at the big picture. The fields don't drain very well and he is not sure if it is in the capital budget to look at the fields in the future.

Mayor Arnowitz said when we built Centennial Field, the engineer told us there would be a drainage problem. We addressed drainage at least three times; by law we had to put down clay and non-pervious soil. They have the same problem in Westwood. We have put tens and thousands of additional dollars there, nothing seems to work. We will look at it again.

Mr. Moldow (Contd).

He plays in the men's baseball league and we have quite a few residents who play and asked if in the future if you could open up Centennial. We never had lights on Sunday and we had to get the games in by 6PM. He asked the Council to consider opening the fields at 9AM Sunday.

Mayor Arnowitz said the Recreation Commission runs it, it is not the Council's decision.

Mr. Moldow (Contd).

He said his commission will reapply for a permit because they pay \$50 per field, a source of revenue; if you get another \$1000, it is \$1000.

Councilmember DeRosa said that is our current ordinance and we cannot begin before 12PM on Sunday and that was approved by the residents.

Mr. Moldow (Contd).
The men's league consists of 22 men.

After a discussion with the Council, the public portion of the meeting was closed.

Borough Attorney Paul suggested that R12192 be removed from the Consent Agenda and held until after the Closed Session so that he can apprise the Council of the topics involved.

Borough Administrator DeJoseph said he worked jointly on R12187 with the Borough Administrator of Westwood as well as Emerson to discuss the utility bill audit and insurance verification. There is no cost to this borough or any borough that is participating in this program. The vendor will come in and

evaluate our bill and any retroactive credits that would come back to the borough will be owned by the borough. There is no cost to the borough, no forward savings, we are going to be obligated to pay the vendor.

With regard to the Borough Clerk to advertise for RFP for telephone service, Telecom, Wire and Data service as well as the RFP for marketing of recyclables, paper and cardboard; also RFP for marketing scrap metal. All three of these items have not been done in the past in Hillsdale; our Borough Clerk had to research to find resolutions authorizing us to go out to bid. The benefit of telephone service is that the borough will save money next year in the budget and the other two items, receive a benefit of increased revenue by opening the market to additional vendors. This has not been done in the past and the town should be proud; it will be great for the 2013 budget.

COUNCIL COMMENTARY

Chief Stalter said an officer came in this morning advising that he needs surgery on both shoulders and the first surgery will be taking place this Friday.

In the afternoon, he and Captain Niego advised Patrolman Sean Smith that he will be Sergeant Smith. He deserves the promotion.

Chief Stalter said after having the promotional process, it was a difficult decision; we have a lot of good, deserving people who are very capable. Hopefully we will be able to accommodate them as time goes on.

Our new patrolman Ryan Norton started yesterday and when Patrolman Smith said he was going to be out, we put him on fast track. We still have to go through field training manual and get everything accounted for but we will make every effort to get him ready as soon as we can.

Chief Stalter heard from the Chief in Bergenfield that Ramon Cruz will be more than likely leaving us on November 6. He was looking to transfer to Bergenfield because they work 12 hour shifts and the pay rate is better. He has not given his two weeks notice yet and is waiting two weeks before he gets sworn in on the 7th.

Mayor Arnowitz said he is a great police officer and Bergenfield is the winner, we are the loser and will be missed.

Chief Stalter and the Captain met with the Administrator with this information coming forth which is giving conditional employment to our next candidate in the hiring process. The conditional offer of employment allows us to do the psychological, medical and background check. We will make the offer in the next day or so; this does not commit us to hiring this person. If something should happen and Ramon does not leave us, we are not obligated to hire this person at this time. It is an unconditional offer of employment. With Officer Smith being out, we want an able body for the holiday season and using vacation time and saving on overtime. Once Officer Cruz is officially gone and the second candidate passes the psychological check and background, offer of employment will be made.

COUNCIL COMMENTARIES

Councilmember DeRosa said at the Board of Education meeting on the 15th they will be discussing the results of the recent ASK testing.

Councilmember Pizzella reminded everyone that this Saturday is Fright Night and a great event for the town.

Councilmember Hanlon said the White House honored one of our residents from Hillsdale, Paul Berman, a very outstanding Optometrist. He was brought to the White House as a Champion of Change for creating a program that has helped nearly 100,000 special Olympic athletes in 80 countries to see better. A few days later there was an editorial and he has been called the Champion of Change and this program honors ordinary Americans doing great work in their communities. She suggested a letter of congratulations or a Certificate and something on the website.

Councilmember MacEwen followed up on Fright Night. It is the largest fund raiser for Cub Pack 231 and Pack 81 and it is important. They raise most of their funds to support trips in town. St. John's Fall Festival will be held on Saturday and at the end of the month, we have the Ragamuffin Parade.

Councilmember Frank said our next meeting will be held November 12; we have election day before that, a very big election, and encouraged people to be informed and to vote. November 11 is Veterans Day and the American Legion will be holding a ceremony in Veterans Park at 11AM on Veterans Day. In the days before and after, we will be visiting the local schools, St. Johns, Pascack Valley, Meadowbrook, White and Smith, meeting the students and telling them what it is like to be a veteran.

Mayor Arnowitz said our normal monthly meeting for November would be election day and we originally scheduled it for the day before. We moved it to November 12 which was going to be our second meeting of the month; the second meeting of the month will be held on November 20.

We most likely will be taking action on Resolution 12192 after the Borough Attorney explains what he wants to explain, we will go back to open.

Road Program

Borough Administrator DeJoseph said the road program is complete

for this year. Melville is repaired which was damaged during a storm in August 2011 and is accessible. Standish, Orchard Lane and parts of Winthrop were repaired; the sidewalk in the back of town hall was repaired, some work on Werimus Road as well as Broadway by Veterans Park was completed today as well. On Lake Drive, the water issue is repaired, a catch basin was put in as well as fully milled and paved. Great job done by the contractor completed in two weeks. The county will come in on the 12th or 13th to do all of the crosswalks on county roads that were worn away as well as additional striping; we will also do additional crosswalks, striping and stop bar on our municipal roads.
